
The Neighborhood Coyote Program provides the following services:

- Hotline Access
- Reporting Tools
- Referrals to Resources
- Pet Safety Planning
- Crisis Intervention
- Workshops and Training



In the month of February, residents have not begun reporting coyote activity utilizing the hotline, online reporting, and Coyote Cacher. The Program met with the Azusa Unified School District to collaborate and identify outreach opportunities for students. The Program engaged the Police Department to determine possible partnerships. All promotional materials were delivered to the SGVCOG office within the last week of February. The materials have been rationed and will be ready to be delivered to the City in the month of March.

Within the City of Azusa there were **0** reports of coyote interactions for the month of February. There were no reports made on Coyote Cacher, Neighborhood Coyote reporting form, nor the Program hotline.

Although no reports were made, there is no definitive information that there is no coyote activity within the City.



It may be beneficial to focus attention on providing information to residents about the Neighborhood Coyote Program, ensuring referrals from City Departments, as well as identifying opportunities to education to residents about normal coyote behaviors, hazing techniques, and coyote attractants.
